Rally against the Pope

Not even god is exempt from child rape!

On Sunday, May 23rd, the San Francisco Atheists sponsored a protest demonstration aimed at the Pope of the world-wide Catholic Church.

The demonstration was held at the large St. Mary of the Assumption Cathedral at the corner of Gough and Geary Streets, from 9:30 to 11:00 a.m.

Approximately 18 to 20 people participated in the protest. About 10



signs were provided for protesters by Don Havis and Larry Hicok, and a few enterprising participants provided their own signs. Some of the signs brought our message home to parishioners and passers-by with messages such as "The Pope Must Resign," "The Pope is not above the law," "I'm sorry is not good enough", and "The Pope must punish pedophile priests."

A flier detailed a small number of particularly egregious cases of pedophile priest abuse cases and Benedict's role when he was Cardinal Ratzinger in covering up deflecting proper punishment for the involved priests. This flier was handed out by our protesters to parishioners as they entered or exited the church. About a third of the passing parishioners accepted the hand-out. The common theme of the protest was a call for justice for the victims of priest abuse and the immediate resignation of Pope Benedict XVI as a minimal gesture toward that end.

We received some limited TV coverage from NBC, which was briefly shown on Channel 3 Bay Area News, with Diane Dwyer at 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Thank you to all that participated, for helping us make visible the guilt of this dubious leader.

Meeting program

This month we feature a talk by David O'Brien entitled "Freethought in the World's Most Christian Country," dealing with his efforts in setting up a Freethought organization in the Philippines.



The Philippines is arguably the most Christian nation in the world with a population of 92 million, of which 90% are Christian while the remainder are mostly Muslim. Even though their constitution is similar to that of the USA, the separation between Church and State is always fragile. In particular the Roman Catholic Church exerts a huge influence over politics, education and social issues. However the recent surge in confidence of the worldwide rationalist and secularist viewpoint has inspired an active Freethought movement in the Philippines that is providing a vehicle for attracting freethinkers and offering a forum for debate, education and activism.

David O'Brien has visited the Philippines numerous times over the past decade and has become an active supporter of filipinofreethinkers.org, based in Manila. His talk will cover the challenges facing the Freethought movement there and highlight some of their positive recent activities and future plans.

O'Brien spent 25 years as a technology executive in Silicon Valley, which included 18 years as CEO of several semiconductor companies. Originally from the U.K. he obtained a PhD in electrical engineering from the University of Wales, U.K. and an MBA from Santa Clara University. Please join us for this talk and the discussions afterwards.

Religiously neutral options

If we, the US public, wish to honor our fallen soldiers, which I personally feel we should. Then we need to do it in a religiously neutral way. As an atheist it offends me spending public money on religious symbols. Why not honor our fallen heroes with a US flag or a statue of a soldier; there are so many religiously neutral options. A christian cross is inappropriate as it does not include all of us. And please do not try to pretend that the cross is not a symbol of religious belief. The cross is a recognizable brand.

A brand is the identity of a specific product, service, or business. A brand can take many forms, including a name, sign, symbol, color combination or slogan. The word brand began simply as a way to tell one person's cattle from another by means of a hot iron stamp. A trademark is a legally protected brand name. The word brand has continued to evolve to encompass identity: in effect the personality of a product, company or service.

Given this I think it safe to say that the christian cross is a brand that represents religious belief. The idea behind this country is pluralism and separation of church and state. If you personally believe in a mystical god, that is your own business. When will you learn that the rest of us do not care, and certainly do not wish to spend public moneys on promoting your fantasy?


